The rhetorical analysis concepts that I found in Attenborough's video were <a href="Ethos">Ethos</a> because he builds legitimacy through his emotions. Also, <a href="Logos">Logos</a> was included in this presentation since he used facts, statistics and data to persuade his audience. Although David Attenborough was calm during his speech, his facial expressions (pathos) were essentially connecting to the audience by sending an urgent message.

During Greta Thunberg's speech, she used several persuasive strategies to convince the audience of how severe global climate change really is. Thunberg's argument focused on the failure of world leaders, she used "pathos" because she looked very emotional during her speech. Greta Thunberg seemed unhappy and frustrated during her speech. Additionally, other components of rhetorical analysis that I observed during Thunberg's video was <a href="Ethos">Ethos</a>. According to Thunberg's speech, she presented a personal experience because she was affected by climate inaction. She also used <a href="Logos">Logos</a> because her speech was well structured around her argument.

I believe that both arguments are strong although it really depends on the audience's perspective. David Attenborough's speech focuses on more scientific facts and logic while Greta Thunberg's speech focused more on the emotional aspects. Even the tone of voice while communicating with the audience was different. Thunberg's speech was more persuasive because she showed specific feelings that connected with her audience.

# Part 2: "Why Do Our Brains Love Fake News?" and "Understanding Argument"

Some of the main information that stood out from the video was how our brain recognizes, considers the information, and researches the information. It is necessary to do research first before we start creating an argument because decades of brain research said that our brains have other plans, a little something called cognitive bias. Cognitive bias is defined as a limitation in our thinking that can cause flaws in our judgments. Fake news often exploits this, and our brains love it, even if we are not conscious of it happening. There are many flavors of cognitive bias, but one of the most researched is confirmation bias. The first step to avoid falling into confirmation bias is by recognizing that we have this type of bias. Step two is to consider that we may not really understand what we think we understand, this is called illusion of explanatory depth. The authors of "Understanding Argument" define argument as reasoned exchange of ideas supported by evidence and logical reasons. It is about how many people perceive the information. The video explained that our brains naturally recognize and process information in ways that are not always rational. Fake news makes misinformation more believable even when

they can not provide complete evidence. This chapter and the video speak to one another by examining our thought processes and being open to evidence to help evaluate arguments based on evidence like specific facts and examples.

The Breitbart report considers work requirements for Medicaid and budgets for many people. Both sources tend to cite sources that align with their respective viewpoints. Media-bias

charts about news sites should be placed at the top because they are recognized for commitment and important information. Also, news sites provide people with a more neutral perspective on critical information.

### Part 2: Claims and Evidence

My argument is about measles vaccine, persuading more people should get vaccinated to help protect the health of the community.

- Claim 1: Vaccines can help stop the spread of contagious diseases like measles in New Mexico outbreak.
- Evidence: According to the CDC 89% of the people infected during the 2024 measles infected outbreaks in the United States were unvaccinated.
- Evidence: Public Health on call reported that Southeastern New Mexico experienced a measles outbreak in 2025.
- Claim 2: Getting vaccinated is a responsible decision that protects yourself and other people in the community.
- Evidence: People should make responsible decisions like taking vaccines, when necessary, like during outbreaks. (Public Health on Call, 2025)
- Evidence: Those who tested positive for measles in New Mexico had to quarantine for 21 days.
- Claim 3: High vaccination rates are the reason measles was nearly eliminated in the past.
- Evidence: Measles was considered eliminated in the United States in 2000, thank you to the highly effective MMR vaccine and high vaccination rates (Public Health on Call, 2025)
- Evidence: This shows how effective vaccines are at removing threats when used widely and consistently.
